# ATMOSPHERES Michaye Boulter Solo Commission 2024

In my studio, there is a large table with a pile of ill-printed photographs; they have been drawn on, ripped up, some photocopied into black and white and drawn on again. There are plenty more in boxes; these are chosen. For the intimate mass of grasses I recall being nestled in, others for a particular memory I can't quite place, an intensity of light or a specific colour, soft duck egg blue, or rich purply greys. They aren't in chronological or geographical order. Sure, they are of places I've spent time in, mostly alone; they are embedded with memory and reverie, but now, in my studio, these images reworked, re-felt, and reimagined into collages become something else. A portal into an imagined realm. Holding these little worlds in my hand, they seem tantalisingly graspable. They are an object, a representation. Even ripped up and drawn on, a photograph purports to be fact. That's its offer of surety. And yet, they are also a passage through reality, time, and emotion. They offer me both clarity and an enigma. And so, I paint to elucidate a certain feeling or atmosphere. And that is how I see these paintings - as a collection of atmospheres. More precisely, they are about the slow transition from one moment to the next. One colour into another. The space between becoming and dissolving, intimacy and distance, presence and absence, harmony and discord.

The story of harvest is told through the historic Robinson Collection of photographic negatives, local growers, contemporary Tasmanian artists, and community. Harvest times have punctuated the agricultural calendar through generations, creating an essential rhythm to which people's lives have followed. In Northern Tasmania, these agricultural seasons continue to be present in everyday life, providing livelihoods and sustenance for many locals. The agricultural landscape is a part of our cultural identity, and the harvest is visible and present to everyone.

Current features newly commissioned and recent work by three First Nations artists, Gail Mabo (Meriam), Lisa Waup (Gunditjmara/ Torres Strait Islands), Dominic White (Palawa/Trawlwoolway). Their work affirms their powerful connection to their lands, waters and ancestors. The exhibition highlights the three vital and contemporary multidisciplinary practices and references the movement in the passages of water along the eastern coast of Australia connecting land and people of the Torres Strait in the far north to Tasmania in the south.

2 March - 13 April


The Interior is an immersive installation combining sculptural seating, richly patterned soft furnishings, and uncanny object d'art, nestled around a hand painted mural to generate a stimulating space to unpack our collective and unconscious biases.

Natalya Hughes, one of Australia's most exciting mid-career artists, is known for her explorations of decorative and ornamental traditions and their associations with the feminine, the human form, and excess. Recent bodies of work investigate the relationship between Modernist painters and their anonymous women subjects.

Many thinkers and theorists have argued that modernity is defined by the rejection of magic. Spirits, fairies, and spells are the domain of children, and rationality is an essential virtue. However, magic has a key role to play in both the personal and broader sociopolitical worlds. Magic has many practical applications, for example, to help heal the rifts between humanity and nature, or to facilitate intergenerational connection and play. Crossing thresholds into places of wonder can be profoundly grounding, connecting us to place, people, and culture. These thresholds to magical realms can be found everywhere, in nature, rituals, dreams, play. To make art is to conjure worlds.

This exhibition seeks to re-enchant. It holds the existence of other, invisible worlds, as truth, and their mystical inhabitants as living.
